# PARENTS SURVEY: HOW CHILDCARE COSTS AFFECT PARENT CHOICES

October 2023





## **KEY FINDINGS**

#### BACKGROUND

- This report outlines selected findings from a larger poll amongst Australian parents of under 6-year-olds.
- It focuses primarily on questions from the survey exploring the relationship between costs and parent choices, especially in terms of using centre-based care. Later questions also look at how childcare commitments (including the need to pay for centre-based care) have affected careers.

#### COSTS OF CENTRE-BASED CARE

- 1. Most people who don't use centre-based care say that one of the reasons for this is that it is too expensive.
- 2. Only 3 in 10 parents who do use centre-based care say that the costs are easily manageable.
- 3. Childcare costs are particularly concerning for those who report being under financial pressure more generally.

#### IMPACT OF CHILDCARE COSTS ON WORK

- 4. 6 in 10 parents say that they or their partner would work different hours if childcare wasn't so expensive
- The vast majority (85%) believe that the cost of living means families don't have a choice and both parents need to work. 90% of those feeling financial pressure believe that this is the case.


COSTS ARE A KEY BARRIER TO USING CENTRE-BASED CARE

### PARENTS OF UNDER 6S ARE MORE LIKELY THAN THE POPULATION AS A WHOLE TO REPORT FEELING UNDER FINANCIAL PRESSURE

 62% of parents with children under the age of 6 say they are struggling financially – compared to 51% of all Australians who agree wit this proposition.





### 68% OF PARENTS HAVE THEIR YOUNG CHILDREN ATTEND DAYCARE




## BUT PEOPLE FACING FINANCIAL PRESSURE ARE LESS LIKELY TO USE CENTRE-BASED CARE




# THERE IS A CLEAR RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN HOUSEHOLD INCOME & PROPENSITY TO USE CENTRE-BASED CARE

Parents aged 40+ are also more likely than parents aged 18-29 to have their child in centre-based care.




### THE PERCENTAGE OF PARENTS ACCESSING CENTRE-BASED CARE ALSO VARIES GREATLY DEPENDING ON THE PLACE OF RESIDENCE

Parents in Queensland, Western Australia and living in provincial / rural areas are clearly less likely to use centre-based daycare.



## MOST PEOPLE WHO DON'T USE CENTRE-BASED CARE SAY THAT COST IS A KEY BARRIER

In addition to that, there are other substantial barriers relating to the system, such as availability of places and flexibility of access.




Other reasons: Prefer to look after child myself / Prefer child(ren) at home / Home school other children (3%), Child too young (3%), Lack of trust in childcare centres (2%), Daycare can be a breeding ground for illnesses (2%), Child will attend once I am no longer on maternity leave / Child on waiting list / Enrolled but not yet started (2%), Have plenty of family help (1%), Child unable to be vaccinated / Immune compromised + Child has special needs (1%), Having twins makes it difficult (1%)

### 7 IN 10 PARENTS WHO DO USE CENTRE-BASED CARE SAY THE COST IS A BURDEN ON THEIR FAMILY FINANCES


There is a strong relationship between financial security and how much of a burden childcare costs are.

Among those who indicate that they are financially secure, 42% think the fees are 'not much of a burden', among those struggling, 62% think the fees are 'a significant burden', and among those in serious difficulty, 42% think the fees are 'barely manageable'.

#### PERCENTAGE OF ALL RESPONDENTS








### THE VAST MAJORITY OF PARENTS BELIEVE MOST FAMILIES NEED BOTH PARENTS TO BE WORKING





This poll surveyed n=1244 parents of under 6s. Quotas and weights were used to ensure that the sample was as representative as possible of all Australian parents of under 6s.

RIM and cell weighting is applied to the data using information sourced from the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) and Australian Electoral Commission (AEC). The factors used in the weighting are age, gender, location and previous vote (May 2022 Federal Election).
