## Re: Mid West Regional Council Dry Season Assistance Forum

To the Productivity Commission,

I refer to correspondence dated June 2008 which invites submissions to be made to an inquiry in to Government Drought Support.

The Mid West Regional Council (MWRC) has championed a Dry Season Assistance Forum to discuss concerns with the assistance being provided to landholders in the North East Agricultural Regions of Western Australia, some of which have experienced simultaneous years of dry seasons.

After several forums and meetings with Minister Chance, the 7 member Shires of the MWRC and the Shires of Chapman Valley, Dalwallinu and Northampton drew up a list of concerns for the government, both Federal and State, to acknowledge and address.

The forum appointed a Dry Season Working Group comprised of representation of landholders, local government, agri business, farm improvement groups and the Department of Agriculture and Food W.A. The purpose of this group is to continue to liaise with the Minister on dry season issues affecting our region and to set a strategic plan relevant to the region and connected with the major stake holders.

The Dry Season Working Group was given the opportunity to present this list of points to the Productivity Commission in Mullewa, W.A on the 18<sup>th</sup> July, 2008. We thank you for this opportunity to present our issues and wish to formally submit these for consideration by your Commission as below;
