# 11A CHILDREN'S SERVICES ATTACHMENT

Definitions for the descriptors and indicators in this attachment are in Section 11A.4. Unsourced information has been obtained from Commonwealth, State and Territory Governments.

# 11A.1 Jurisdictions' comments

## **Commonwealth Government comments**



The Commonwealth Department of Health and Family Services is responsible for the Commonwealth Government's policy and programs to provide accessible, affordable, quality child care.

Data collected through the Department's Annual Child Care Census; the Quality Improvement and Accreditation System; and the Program planning and administrative systems provide a comprehensive national picture of the Commonwealth's involvement in child care.

While there has been a general commitment to develop data collection processes that ensure data are collected in the format required for reporting under the agreed performance indicators, the Commonwealth is concerned about the possibility of double counting of service provision and consequent distortions in reporting and analysis particularly where preschool programs are provided in long day care centres.

The Commonwealth recommends that consideration be given to streamlining the data collection processes and reports pertaining to children's services in light of overlaps that now exist with collections and reports such as *Australia's Welfare* and those undertaken by the National Community Services Information Management Group.



### **New South Wales Government comments**



Families require services that are affordable, convenient, safe and provide appropriate age development programs for their children. NSW aims to provide a child care system that is responsive to these needs.

Statewide and local service planning is undertaken to ensure policy objectives are met and that an appropriate mix of services is available to meet families' needs. The NSW regulations for centre-based services for children under school age enable the delivery of a seamless service system within which individual service models co-exist with multi-purpose and less traditional service types. What is traditionally termed as a 'preschool' program is available for children whether they attend a preschool, a long day care, or an occasional care service. NSW recognises that exposure to a quality early childhood education service can give children an opportunity for an important head start in life. Funding is specifically targeted to address access issues for children from disadvantaged and vulnerable families and communities so they may participate in quality programs.

Priorities for NSW in 1996–97 saw a number of new initiatives announced or commenced, aimed at improving choice, affordability, supply and quality, and at improving mechanisms for compliance to standards.

The requirements of families participating in the workforce and the need for places for children under three years was acknowledged through approval of \$5.5 million in capital funding to increase supply for this age group by an additional 700 places. As well, an additional \$6.2 million was allocated to improve the choice and supply of services by an extra 970 places to make services more affordable, and to upgrade health and safety aspects. These initiatives are additional to the continued maintenance of funding effort for the sector, including continuance of an operational subsidy for community based long day care services.

New regulations for the sector which progress and strengthen the standards by which services are licensed and must operate, have been introduced. The NSW Department of Community Services, which has responsibility for children's services, has developed a risk management approach for compliance monitoring of these regulated standards. The approach was developed with major industry representatives. It identifies risks against a set regulatory elements such as the physical environment. health/hygiene/nutrition, policies and programs, and staff/child interaction. The approach gives service providers a clear picture of their duty of care responsibilities and what priority issues they need to manage to ensure they provide a service that is safe for children. It also gives Departmental staff very clear targets for regulatory compliance work.

### **Victoria Government comments**



The Department of Human Services (DHS) regulates and/or funds children's services in Victoria; it is not directly involved in service provision.

In Victoria, there are approximately 3200 registered centre-based services for children aged 0 to 6 years. A new legislative and regulatory framework is being developed for these services. The *Children's Services Act 1996*, which was passed by the Parliament in the Spring Session 1996, establishes for the first time a separate legislative framework for children's services in Victoria. Such a framework offers a flexible and streamlined approach to the provision of children's services. Regulations to be made under the Act will be finalised in early 1998, following responses to the Regulatory Impact Statement. The new children's services legislation will be implemented by 1 July 1998.

In addition, Victoria either funds directly or manages Commonwealth/State Government funding to approximately 1800 agencies providing children's services at approximately 2600 service delivery locations across the state, including preschool, occasional care, TAFE long day care and school age services. The State also provides information and publications to support regulated and funded services, and the broad children's services sector.

Victoria is committed to the development of flexible, integrated services, enabling families to access a range of services at the one location. An increasing number of long day care centres are offering a funded preschool service, with 337 long day care centres receiving preschool funding in 1997 compared with 176 in 1996. Increased integration is also demonstrated by almost 90 per cent of funded preschool locations offering at least one other type of children's service in addition to the funded preschool service. In addition, Victoria has recently announced that state primary schools will be able to become preschool providers from 1998. Furthermore, the establishment of the Office of the Family within DHS aims to increase links between children's services and other services to families.

Victoria collects and analyses a considerable amount of data on children's services; however, many of the items collected differ from the data requirements for this Report. While the Working Group has, during 1997, refined some of the definitions for the descriptors and indicators used, it has only been possible for Victoria to provide a relatively small number of items this year. The ability to provide common national data items is restricted by the diversity in the operational and administrative arrangements in the children's services sector and the lead time required to modify existing data collections. Victoria (and the Working Group) will re-examine these issues in 1998.

### **Queensland Government comments**



Queensland is committed to enhancing child care and education provision throughout the state. For example, funding initiatives have focused on expanding the range and diversity of services which respond flexibly to the needs of children and their families, as in:

- Rural Children's Centres Program which aims over three years to develop services in up to 40 small rural and remote communities;
- Remote Area Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Child Care Program which supports services in Far North Queensland communities;
- Outside School Hours Care Upgrading Program which assists services to improve facilities to meet national standards; and
- Outside School Hours Care Activities for Young People Program which establishes safe and supervised programs for 13 to 15 year olds.

In addition, child care legislation has been reviewed to incorporate national standards for LDC and FDC. Consultation is under way to implement National Standards for Outside School Hours Care. Queensland continues to work with training institutions to enhance training offered to early childhood students and to increase the number of courses offered across the state.

The Queensland Child Care Information Service assisted more than 18 000 child care consumers, students, developers and others in 1997, a 53 per cent increase over 1996. Callers to the free telephone service are provided with comprehensive information on the location of services, how to access assistance with fees, and services for children with special needs. More than 15 000 free publications to assist parents were distributed and a web site on the Internet now gives customers 24 hours access to information about child care in Queensland.

The *Preschool Curriculum Guidelines*, developed by the Queensland School Curriculum Council, were distributed free in early 1998 to teachers of preschool-age children in all relevant settings. The *Guidelines* are intended to assist teachers with designing an effective preschool curriculum. They establish the purposes, balance and outcomes of preschool education and demonstrate how all aspects of learning and development are integrated. Professional development courses are being developed by training providers to support the implementation of the guidelines. Course providers will be registered by Education Queensland to ensure high quality course materials and delivery.

The Queensland Government is committed to the ongoing development and refinement of data collection against the agreed performance indicators.

### **Western Australia Government comments**



WA is committed to the principle of ensuring quality care for children and early educational opportunities for all children prior to commencement of full-time schooling.

Family and Children's Services is responsible for licensing of child care places, support to providers and contributes to planning for new services. The Education Department of WA provides early childhood education programs in the form of a kindergarten program for children in the year they turn four and a pre-primary program for children in the year they turn five. Currently Family and Children's Services also provides kindergarten places by funding and supporting community groups to run services. These places are being progressively transferred to the Education Department.

The state has comprehensive regulations for child care services including all family day carers irrespective of their participation in FDC schemes, and occasional care. During 1997 the Community Services (Child Care) Regulations have been reviewed and feedback sought from the public and industry representatives on the deliberations of the Review Committee. This process will be completed in 1998 and changes to regulations implemented.

Consultations are under way with service providers, industry representatives and parents regarding the maintenance of standards in OSHC with a possible option being to regulate these services.

The Education Department plans to increase provision of early childhood education programs in the years ahead: in 1998 all children will have access to a full-time (four days per week) government funded pre-primary program in the year they turn five and by 2001 all children will have access to a government funded kindergarten program in the year they turn four.

During 1997 the Education Department and Family and Children's Services have supported a pilot project to deliver Education Department Kindergarten programs in community based child care centres. This will continue in 1998.

The body of the Report includes cautionary notes on making comparisons between states and territories. It should also be noted that the WA child care figures to not include children attending early childhood education programs; these are included in the child care figures for some other states and territories.



### **South Australia Government comments**



The Department for Education and Children's Services (DECS) is the State Government agency responsible for children's services in SA. It operates the majority of preschool services (97 per cent) with the remaining operated by non-government and religious organisations. DECS also has responsibility for the administration of OSHC and FDC services, performs the licensing function for child care centres and provides advisory and specialist support for all children's services.

During 1997 a Licensing and Standards Unit was centralised to carry out all of the licensing functions. This single point of service is designed to ensure greater consistency in administration of the regulations and to improve customer service to operators of child care services. The changed administration arrangements have also provided the basis for the centralised collection of data relating to complaints and breaches which will enable SA to accurately report on these matters in subsequent reports.

During 1996–97, 10 child care centres closed in the state. It is anticipated that there may be additional closures in the future if services are unable to adjust their operations in response to loss of operational subsidy.

One of the priorities for DECS in 1997 has been to strengthen the management of child care services and assist them in adjusting to the funding changes. A number of amalgamations have occurred. DECS has also funded the Child Care Business Initiative (Kidsbiz) in community-based centres. Kidsbiz provides centres with a computerised administration and management system as well as an ongoing consultancy service. It is currently operational in 81 centres across the state.

A further priority for DECS is to support the OSHC sector to plan for the necessary adjustments arising from Commonwealth funding changes. A feasibility study into the expansion of Kidsbiz to OSHC services will be carried out in 1998.

Curriculum support and staff development continue to be a major focus within DECS. The curriculum document *Foundation Areas of Learning* for 3 to 4 year olds (FALS) has been implemented in all preschools and is widely used in child care services. A document *Deadly Nukin Ere* — *Aboriginal Perspectives on Foundation Areas of Learning* is being developed as a supplementary curriculum resource, and a second FALS document for children from 0 to 3 years is in development. A particular focus on early literacy has resulted in the implementation of the ECLIPSE early learning program which is designed to support children's early literacy and is developed for use by staff and parents.



### **Tasmania Government comments**



The Tasmanian Government currently divides the provision of children's services between two separate departments: the Department of Community and Health Services (DCHS) which provides support for a range of child care services for children 0 to 12 years, and the Department of Education, Community and Cultural Development (DECCD), which provides non-compulsory kindergarten (preschool) services as an entry to the education system.

In July 1997, DCHS implemented the new Tasmanian Centre Based Child Care Licensing Guidelines incorporating national standards for long day care which have been the subject of consultation and review between government and the child care industry since 1995. All new long day care centres will now be required to meet these standards before being licensed and action plans are currently being developed for existing centres setting out steps towards meeting all standards by the year 2000.

Another major focus during 1996–97 was the Review of the Department of Community and Health Services. Among other things, the Review was commissioned to recommend appropriate service groupings in the Department and associated structural changes to enable a better response to the needs of the Tasmanian community, particularly in the light of Tasmania's demographic profile, and health and wellbeing status. The Review's recommendations were framed to ensure like services are linked together, thus maximising integration and co-ordination in support of service delivery.

This resulted in the Review recommending that responsibility for child care be transferred from DCHS to DECCD to facilitate greater policy linkages between early childhood education and child care. This transfer takes effect from January 1998.

The Tasmanian response is limited to data that the state already collects and which is deemed reliable. A problem experienced for the 1996–97 financial data in particular stemmed from difficulties in matching information held with the requirements of this Report. The Tasmanian Government is committed, within its resources, to ongoing development of data collection systems.



## **Australian Capital Territory Government comments**



Recent changes to the ACT workforce have altered the child care usage patterns in the last year. The effects of these changes are that fewer parents are participating in the workforce thus requiring less child care and resulting in high vacancy rates. More parents are working part-time and some have moved away from Canberra. Impacts of these social and demographic changes on preschool and child care can be seen in lower usage of both services. Baby vacancies in long day care are high whilst occasional care is experiencing an increased demand for baby places.

There is differing reporting of occasional care usage in the ACT according to whether it is funded by the Commonwealth or the ACT Governments. Usage is reported as 5.3 hours per week in Commonwealth services and as 8 hours in ACT funded services. Occasional care has met a need for parents who arrived in the ACT without the support of extended families. Its usage has extended in recent years to include part-time and casual work related, as well as occasional respite care for family support purposes.

School age care including vacation care services in the ACT enjoy a one to ten staff to child ratio and therefore costs of services are greater than in those jurisdictions where services may have fewer staff to children. The ACT has now implemented national standards in its licence conditions for school age care.

Over the past three years, the ACT Government funded some pilot programs for provision of school age care programs for children and adolescents with disabilities. Evaluation of these programs has been very positive and there is strong community support for ongoing provision and expansion of these services particularly for adolescents both after school and in vacations.

When ACT administrative costs are compared with costs incurred by other jurisdictions, it should be noted that the ACT Government combines the roles of Territory and municipal Governments and is also the only jurisdiction that currently licenses school age care and vacation care.



## **Northern Territory Government comments**



The NT has a young population, with a high proportion of children with families in the workforce. In 1995, 51 per cent of children 0 to 4 years and 75 per cent of children 5 to 12 years in the NT had families in the paid workforce.

The NT Government is committed to supporting the provision of child care for NT families and in 1997 approved a Five Year Children's Services Plan to:

- improve access to child care services;
- tailor services to meet family needs;
- ensure quality in services for children;
- maintain the affordability of child care and development services; and
- ensure that child care and development services are coordinated for the convenience of families and children.

The NT Government provides an operational subsidy to all licensed child care centres. Child care costs in the NT remain amongst the lowest in Australia. The average centre-based fee in 1996–97 was \$136 for a 50 hour week.

Under the joint Commonwealth/NT Agreement, four innovative pilot projects on remote Aboriginal communities are being undertaken to provide services for children 0 to 5 years. The services have a particular focus on culture appropriateness. Progress in the development of innovative services has been limited by constraints such as access to the communities in the wet season, high cost of construction and the recruitment and training of staff. A service evaluation will take place 12 months after commencement of the centres.

National minimum standards for child care centres have been approved for implementation in the NT. Implementation of minimum standards for other areas of the child care sector are expected in the near future to further enhance the quality of services available to NT families.

In 1996–97, an additional 320 places became available. This was partly the result of a reduction in the indoor play space required per child, which brought NT regulations into line with the National Minimum Standards. There was also a significant growth in the private sector. Private providers now operate approximately 29 per cent of centre-based child care places in the NT, an increase of 8 per cent since 1995–96.

The NT data collection is limited and unfortunately does not correspond with the required format of this Report. Development of more effective data collection and analysis has been included in the Children's Service Plan to enhance reporting and monitoring in the future.
