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### FIRE SERVICES (CHAPTER 9)


- Reporting in the emergency management chapter focuses on emergency management services provided for fire, ambulance, and road rescue, events. This factsheet focuses on fire services.
- Information is reported on the performance of fire service organisations (FSOs). These are the primary agencies involved in providing emergency management services for fire events — an incident that is reported to an FSO and requires a response. Fire events include (but are not limited to): structure fires (fires inside a building or structure), regardless of whether there is damage to the structure; landscape fires, including bushfires and grass fires, regardless of the size of the area burnt; other fires, including vehicle and other mobile property fires, and outside rubbish fires.
- Recurrent expenditure on fire services across Australia was approximately \$2.4 billion (or \$117.07 per person) in 2007-08 (pp. 9.13 and 31). Nationally, there were 17 891 full time equivalent paid personnel and 218 853 volunteers in FSOs in 2007-08 (pp. 9.8 and 14).

### Objectives of Emergency management


- To reduce the adverse effects of emergencies and disasters on the Australian community (including people, property, infrastructure, economy and environment).
- To contribute to the management of risks to the Australian community.
- To enhance public safety.

(p. 9.29)




Annual fire death rate, three year rolling average<sup>a</sup>
