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### FIRE EVENTS (CHAPTER 9)


- Reporting in the emergency management chapter focuses on emergency management services provided for fire, road rescue and ambulance events. Fire events are the focus of this factsheet.
- Fire events include (but are not limited to): structure fires (fires inside a building or structure), regardless of whether there is damage to the structure; landscape fires, including bushfires and grass fires, regardless of the size of the area burnt; other fires, including vehicle and other mobile property fires, and outside rubbish fires (p. 9.15). Nationally, fire service organisations (FSOs) attended more than 108 000 fire incidents in 2009-10 (p. 9.17).
- Performance reporting for fire events includes information on FSOs as the primary agencies involved in providing emergency management services for fire events. Recurrent expenditure on FSOs across Australia was more than \$2.9 billion (or approximately \$132 per person) in 2009-10 (pp. 9.15 and 9.35). Nationally, there were 17 278 full time equivalent paid personnel and 221 848 volunteers in FSOs in 2009-10 (pp. 9.10 and 9.17).

### Objectives of emergency management


- To reduce the adverse effects of emergencies and disasters on the Australian community (including people, property, infrastructure, economy and environment).
- To contribute to the management of risks to the Australian community.
- To enhance public safety (p. 9.12).

Structure fires contained to the object/room of origin<sup>a</sup> (p. 9.33)




Annual fire death rate, three year rolling average<sup>a</sup> (p. 9.38)
